A Note from the Preacher...

Perhaps one of the biggest problems some folks have with the Bible is that it is filled with people and situations that are all too familiar to our own lives. And the Bible handles people's lives honestly, showing all the wrinkles and imperfections. We may not stop to think about it, but there are generally several characteristics of the churches mentioned by John in chapters two and three of Revelation that are true in our church. Some of the less positive personality traits in people like Samson or Peter are in us if we look hard enough.

In the past couple of years one of my favorite people from the Bible has been Moses. He often showed his human side, wrinkles and imperfections, even though he was called by God (literally). He audibly heard God's call and eventually said, "O my Lord, please send someone else." (Exodus 4:13) As we get to know him, we realize that for Moses to have achieved anything, it had to be God working in and through him.

Consider for a moment that he is the only person in the biblical record that receives incredible descriptions:

"Thus, the LORD used to speak to Moses face to face, as one speaks to a friend..."
(Exodus 33:11)

"Never since has there arisen a prophet in Israel like Moses, whom the LORD knew face to face." (Deuteronomy 34:10)

These are amazing statements. Can you even imagine it? Even though we may call it a New Testament thought, it is true in the Old Testament as well: *It is for God's purpose that Moses, you, and I have come to this hour...Father, glorify your name.* After Jesus Christ, Moses could easily have come in second place for living out the truth found in this statement.

Beginning in September, and going through the end of November, sermons will come from Exodus, meaning one of the main characters will often be Moses. Occasionally someone else takes the lead, but Moses is usually somewhere around. Over the next several weeks we will see the foundations being laid for the deliverance of God's people.

Guest Speaker - Sunday, September 15, Lora Jones

Here I was holding Lora's book, "Song of a Wounded Heart," an author's early release copy so I could read it and pray how God would have me help Lora in this next step of HIS story in her life. Yet I confess I was scared to read it. I remember coming home from Thanksgiving 2004 and learning Lora had lost her husband, and two children in an auto accident. I prayed immediately for God's comfort to surround Lora and wrap her in His arms—He gave her a song.

Here is an excerpt from her book:

"The memory sobered me. Not only did God choose me to be born, but He chose me to survive an accident where I should have died. My Creator showed me a partial answer to the "Why do you want me here?" question. He gave me an assignment, and an audience I didn't seek. I needed to know what to tell them.

So, I began to barrage God with my questions.

How do we live with this kind of pain? Is there healing for a wounded heart? You are a Healer. What does that mean for pain of the heart? When someone breaks an arm, it's healed when there is no more pain. When someone has surgery, they know they are healed when there's no more pain. What is healing of the heart? How can we be healed if the pain never ceases? Or is there no healing for this? God, if you want me to talk to people, I need the answers!

I prayed; I read the Scriptures; I read books people gave me about grief; I read autobiographies of loss; I read Christian fictional stories of people who endured pain. Everywhere I searched for nuggets of truth; people, books, God, and the Bible. Answers evaded me for quite some time.

Little by little God revealed the truth. An idea began to form from various pieces of those sources mixed together, until one day a phrase crystallized in my mind.

Healing is not the absence of pain.

Disappointed tears fell down my cheeks. Then what is healing, God?

'Healing is allowing joy to enter a heart of pain,' God explained.

Oh!! Pain and joy coexisting. That means my heart is functioning again!"

The Bag Lady

I was not doing what I wanted to be doing on July 4, 1975. I wanted to be sipping ice tea at the cookout that my boyfriend had invited me to attend. Instead, I was working.

July 4th is a big sales day for retail establishments, and the Portsmouth, Virginia furniture store that employed me was no exception. At 9:00 a.m., I and five of my co-workers stood at the front of the store, waiting to service the hoard of furniture shoppers who were sure to be coming through our doors soon. We worked on the "up" system. Before the store had opened, we had drawn numbers from a basket. The sales person who drew number 1 would attend to the first

customer who came through the door; the one who drew number 2 would attend to the second, and so on. I drew number 4.

Sales persons one and two greeted customers almost immediately. About ten minutes elapsed before customer number 3, a tired looking older woman, walked through the door. This woman looked like someone who had been hit by hard times. She was wearing a ratty winter coat (even though the temperature was in the nineties), flip-flops, and a wide-brimmed straw hat. In her right hand she held a large brown paper grocery bag.

“Do I have to help her?” asked the salesman who had drawn number 3. “She’s a bag lady, for Christ’s sake!”

The store owner, Mr. S, scrutinized the woman before replying, “She’s probably come in to take advantage of our air conditioning. Just ignore her. She’ll leave soon enough.”

She did not leave, and while I waited for customer number 4, she looked back at us repeatedly.

“Don’t you think someone should at least say hello?” I inquired.

“If you talk to her, she’ll never leave,” Mr. S answered. “She’ll monopolize your time and you won’t make any sales.”

I knew he was probably right, but I looked back at her, and she was staring at me. The puzzled look in her eyes was clearly saying ‘why won’t you help me?’

She reminded me of my mother. Even after my father had gotten a job that paid well, my mother refused to buy new clothes. “We never know how long the job will last,” she reasoned. “I aim to save as much money as I can for that rainy day that’s sure to come.” I used to wonder why the clerks in the stores where we shopped sometimes ignored her. Now I knew the reason.

I could not look away from this bag lady’s eyes. “I’m going to go speak to her,” I told Mr. S.

“Go ahead,” he sighed. “But don’t blame me when everyone else racks up big sales today and you end up with nothing.”

I nodded and walked over to the woman. “Hi,” I greeted her with a smile. “How can I help you today?”

“I’m looking for a new living room suite, a new dining room suite, and a new bedroom suite.” She asserted. “I just got a new apartment.”

“Very well,” I responded, “come with me and I will show you what we have.”

After walking through the living room section three times she finally stopped to ask questions about royal blue velvet sectional that cost \$999.99. She wanted to know what made that sofa worth that much money. I was well-versed on the strengths of that particular suite, so I quickly explained them to her. She nodded, accepting my explanations.

“And those tables,” she asked, pointing to the set of 3 chrome and glass tables that accessorized the suite. “What makes them worth \$300.00?”

“They’re tempered glass,” I enlightened her. “They’re four to six times the strength of regular glass, and if the glass breaks it shatters into round pieces that can’t cut anyone.” She did not seem impressed, so I added, “These tables are so strong you can stand on them.”

“I’m looking for tables that lamps can stand on; not people,” she informed me. She pointed to a set of wooden tables across the room. “I’ll take those,” she said.

By this time, I had been with the woman for forty-five minutes. Meanwhile, sales persons 1, 2, 3, and 5 were closing multiple sales. I silently berated myself to not listening to Mr. S. He had been in this business a lot longer than me. His was the wise voice of experience.

After similarly scrutinizing the dining room furniture, she selected a chrome and glass dining room table with 6 leather chairs. “I might actually want to stand on that sometime,” she shared with me. She took over two hours to select a bedroom suite, a French provincial set made of fruitwood. At \$1,549.99, it was the most expensive suite we carried. I invited her to join me at

my desk, but she insisted she needed to choose lamps for her new living room and bedroom suites first.

After another hour had passed, she was satisfied that she had everything she wanted. As I pulled a chair up to my desk for her, I glanced at Mr. S. He was shaking his head. I knew exactly what he was thinking, "I told you so!" I did not relish the thought of the scorching lecture that would soon be coming my way; not to mention the beating I would be giving myself for offering to help this woman.

I took a blank contract from my desk drawer and began to fill it out. She supplied me with her name, address, and phone number (clearly, she was making this stuff up!), but hesitated when I asked for her Social Security number. "What do you need that," she wanted to know.

"I need your Social Security number to get your credit approved," I insisted (like I actually thought she could get approved).

"I'm not buying this on credit!" she thundered. "I'm paying cash."

Mr. S, standing behind me, actually giggled, prompting snickers from the rest of the sales staff.

I ignored them. They could be dealt with later. I needed to get rid of this woman before she ruined my sales for the rest of the day.

"Very well," I said in my most business-like voice, "your total with sales tax comes to \$3,795.96. Since you are paying cash, I won't charge you for delivery. I'll write up your receipt while you go get the money."

"I don't need to go get the money," she smiled. "I got it with me."

She proceeded to open up that brown paper grocery bag sitting beside her. After removing several layers of newspaper, she started lifting banded packs of one-hundred-dollar bills and placing them on my desk. "There's \$3,800. You owe me \$4.04 change," she announced.

I wrote up a delivery slip and sent it back to our warehouse. Mr. S. was speechless, as the sales staff gasped in disbelief. I could hardly believe it myself. This had to be a dream!

But it was not a dream. I escorted her to the front door, and as I opened the door for her, I advised, "You ought to put that money in a bank account. It's not safe to walk around this city with that kind of cash in a paper grocery bag."

A sly smile spread across her face. "Don't you worry about me, Sugar," she reassured me. "Everybody thinks I'm a bag lady."

PERFECT PEACE

"Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on Thee: because he trusted in Thee."
Isa. 26:3

About 23 years ago I had a time where I experienced this wonderful peace that "passes all understanding" (Phil 4:7). I tell it now, hoping it will be a blessing to someone else.

It all started innocently enough with a routine colonoscopy where cancer was discovered. That was the start of a period of about seven weeks when the peace of God was mine.

At the doctor's office with the "good news" I was given some pictures and written material and told to contact a surgeon of my choice as soon as possible. Since I had no prior contact with surgeons, I pulled out the Yellow Pages and called one and set up an appointment. The surgeon accepted my information and set up an appointment for surgery to remove a large portion of my colon.

A couple of days later I called a close friend who was going through the same thing, (and wasn't doing well), and he made me promise not to do as he had done, going to a general surgeon, but to go to the very best cancer specialist I could find. The problem was there were none in my area on our health plan, but one was finally found 85 miles away in Orlando, Fl. An appointment was made and I was told to bring all the material I had been given by the gastroenterologist. Well, at the appointment it was apparent he was not happy with what material I had to show him, and he said to contact the people to send him ALL they had. As a lamb being led to the slaughter I said, "OK", and I consequently did.

About two weeks later the surgeon's office called saying they still didn't have the information needed, so another phone call was made to the pathologists who assured me they would get the information to the surgeon right away. Then with about one week until surgery I received another call saying the doctor still hadn't received the information. Another call to the pathologists with time running out fast, and the assurance again that they were sending it.

During this entire seven-week period of time I had total peace about what I was facing. Here was my close friend dying from the same thing I had been diagnosed with, but I had no fear of what I was facing. I literally didn't think about it, I was in the Lord's hands, and that was good enough for me. I didn't think about it except when I had to make phone calls, etc., otherwise it wasn't on my radar. Even now as I write this, I'm still overwhelmed by the peace I had in that time of trouble.

Anyway, the rest of the story.
