A note from the pastor:

How familiar are you with 1 John? Many people are familiar with the Gospel of John, but this first of three short letters is not as well known. The author is not mentioned, but the early church fathers, who lived within 100 years of the time John wrote these letters, all agree the apostle wrote this. This letter tells of the author's eyewitness testimony that is consistent with "the disciple whom Jesus loved." In addition, this letter uses many of the same phrases and contrasts as the gospel: light and darkness, life and death, truth and lies, love and hate.

This letter also comes at a time when the church is under spiritual attack from teachings that are not the gospel. As a result, this letter can also be viewed as a series of tests to see if a person and their teaching is correct or filled with inaccurate and false heresies. This letter was written to warn and instruct churches to be alert!

If we compare 1 John 1:1-4 with John 1:1-5, we are told about both the human and divine natures that are present in the person of Jesus Christ. John testifies to the fact that he has seen, heard, and touched Jesus. John also wants us to know that at the heart of the gospel message he is sharing, a person will find joy.

In 1 John 2:1-6, we come to a vital test of a follower of Jesus Christ: obedience. Yes, we sin. No, we do not always get it right. But we know that Jesus is the "atoning sacrifice of our sins, and not only for ours but also for the sins of the whole world." The greatest way to show that we love

God is to back up our words with 1 John 2:5: "... if anyone obeys (God's) word, God's love is truly made complete in him."

When we move to the opposite of obedience to Jesus' commands, we arrive at 1 John 2:15-17. We each have to decide, do we have love for our heavenly Father, our love for the things of this world? We will all be one or the other, but we cannot be both. Once again, we hear the teaching that followers of Christ will be looking to the interests and needs of others before looking to their own (other-focused). A lover of the world will only be concerned with the "god of me" (self-centeredness). 1 John 2:17 contains the great warning: "The world and its desires pass away..." and great promise: "...but the man who does the will of God lives forever."

The antichrist. This description only appears in 1 and 2 John, and he is referring to anyone who denies that Jesus is the Christ. The greatest problem we find in 1 John 2:18-25 is that this is not a spiritual attack from outside the Body of Christ, but from inside. There will always be those who know what to say and how to act, at least on Sundays, but in the end, "they did not really belong to us." This is one more reason the church must be alert, knowing what we believe, and able to see falsehood for what it is. The greatest weapons we have are the Word of God and our Christian community.

The fact of the matter is that this letter is as relevant for the church today as it was in the first century. The problems being addressed here are still present in the church. And the blessing of eternal life continues to give us confidence.
