A note from the pastor:

Is it really worth it? Wouldn't it be easier to join in with the rest of the world? The more committed we are to Christ, the more we stick out as a light in a dark world. As the same time, the more committed we are to Christ, the more we understand the incredible love God has for us.

1 John 3:1-3 begins with, "See what kind of love the Father has gives us". What a beautiful warmth should flood through us as we read those words! Operation Reach-Out: Providing HOPE & HELP to Monroe

"As much as you did it to these the least of my brothers & sister, you did it to me." (Matthew 25:40)

In the heart of Monroe, Operation Reach Out lives out this biblical calling every day, serving those facing difficult times in Union County. Through a comprehensive range of programs, this faith-based organization addresses both the spiritual and physical needs of the community's most vulnerable residents.

Serving the Whole Person

Operation Reach Out offers daily Bible study followed by a free lunch, providing a welcoming space where those who are struggling can find community and a hot meal. In partnership with local churches, restaurants, and individuals, they feed both body and soul.

For the homeless and those with no fixed address, the organization provides essential services including hot showers, laundry facilities, and free monthly haircuts. The Clothing Closet ensures community members have appropriate attire and shoes, while Joseph's Food Pantry provides emergency food boxes and monthly food assistance for elderly residents.

Crisis Support When It Matters Most

One of the organization's most vital services is financial assistance for crisis situations-helping with energy bills, medications, gasoline, and other urgent needs for low-income and elderly citizens. This direct aid can make the difference between keeping the lights on or going without.

Operation Reach Out also operates Finders Keepers, a resale store offering discounted goods, and hosts the NC Baptist Men's Dental Bus for free dental care. Each year, they host "Lord of the Harvest," a community Thanksgiving Dinner, and conduct food and hygiene item drives to keep their pantry stocked.

How You Can Help

Operation Reach Out relies on community generosity to continue serving those in need. They welcome monetary donations, nonperishable food, clothing, toiletries, laundry supplies, and volunteers to teach Bible studies or serve meals.


