A Note from the Pastor...

If you follow a liturgical calendar, Advent takes on two different roles. The one we are most familiar with encompasses the four Sundays before Christmas, marking the advent of Christ's birth. But the other role of Advent is to usher in the new Church year. Advent may come at the end of our calendar year, but it marks the beginning of the year as we consider our relationship with God through Jesus Christ.

At the same time, when we come to the Christmas season, I find it almost impossible not to make the jump to Good Friday and Easter. I suppose it is for this reason that I look forward to celebrating Communion on Christmas Eve. Christmas is eternally linked to all we remember and celebrate when we approach the Lord's Table. As has been the case in the past, when we worship on Christmas Eve, this will be our celebration of Communion for the month of December.

When we begin to talk about the Advent and Christmas season, one of the great challenges for pastors is trying to find something new or different to talk about. This season all the passages we will be looking at come from the prophet Isaiah. Hundreds of years before the first Christmas in Bethlehem, this prophet said more about the coming and the work of Jesus Christ than any other Old Testament writer. We will hear about the light of the LORD, the knowledge of the LORD, and the joy and glory of the LORD. However, we know that, while "everyone" is supposed to be happy and joyous this time of the year, this is not always the case. Isaiah even covers this when, in Isaiah 7:10-16, people were truly scared at what they saw happening on the international stage around them. Immanuel would be appearing right in the middle of it all providing a sign of God's presence regardless of our circumstances. And in the darkness of the world as well as our lives, there is light...not just a small light at the end of the tunnel, but a "great light". Finally, as we look behind at the past year and ahead at the coming year, Isaiah 55 gives an invitation to an abundant, joyful life found only when we follow the LORD. Are you *really* ready for Christmas?

The session of Walkersville EPC met on November 18, 2019 @ 7:00 pm in the church library. Elders present were Boyet Twitty, Hazel Norwood, Dean Haney, Jim McGee, Dennis Robinson and Rev. Paul Rankin, moderator.

The meeting was opened with Bible reading from Nehemiah 1:1-10 and prayer.

The minutes for October 22, 2019 and the congregational meeting on October 20, 2019 were read and approved.

Dean Haney presented the treasurer's report prepared by Beverly Haney. The report was accepted and approved by the session. Dean Haney also presented the 2020 proposed budget prepared by the finance committee. The session made the motion to dissolve the \$1,000.00 line item in the budget giving to Pochocuape School Mission (Nicaragua) The school gets 1/2 of all funds made from the four chicken and dumplings each year before expenses. The men and women also give to Nicaragua. Session approved.

Ministry Team Reports

Building & Grounds - Boyet reported that the concrete work had been completed at the take out station and the ramp at the back of the church under the walkway. Building and Grounds will be installing handrails around the new ramp when weather permits.

Christian Education - No report

Congregational Care - A letter was presented to the session to be signed by the clerk of session and the pastor allowing Bob McCain from Walkersville EPC and Jerry Helms from Prospect United Methodist to permit them to write checks from Faith Works checking and to administer funds that were put in the United Methodist Endowment funds. These are two separate accounts.

Mission Outreach - The session approved \$204.00 yearly for website maintenance. This would be a line item for mission and outreach.

On August 21, 2010, Dalton Duling died. A former Richmond, VA police sergeant, he spent the last thirty-seven years of his life bringing Christmas to children whose parents could not afford to buy gifts.

As I read his obituary, I remembered that my husband, Phil, had worked with Duling's wife, Dale. She had given Phil an 8 by 10 autographed black and white photo of Sergeant Santa for our granddaughter Morgan. Phil asked me to put it in a safe place. I put it in a place that was so safe, I forgot where it was.

When Morgan was five years old, she asked me, "Mawmaw, is Santa Claus pretend?"

I was not sure how to answer that question. In Virginia's Appalachian Mountains, where I was born, Santa did not come to our small, one-room house. Daddy said that our roof would not support a sleigh with eight reindeer, no matter how tiny they were.

When I gave birth to my daughter, Melanie, I decided that she would not be fooled, as I had been, by the Santa myth.

Eighteen years later, when I walked into Melanie's hospital room, my arms reaching for my new granddaughter, Melanie held her baby close and growled, "This child *will* believe in Santa Claus!"

What could I do but play along? And I must admit that when I awakened on the Christmas day that Morgan was three years old, I was thrilled to hear her sit up in bed and call out loudly, "Did he come?"

She was in awe when she found the toys and the letter that Santa had left for her. She was smiling and crying at the same time as her mother read the letter to her.

And now this same child was asking me, "Mawmaw, is Santa Claus pretend?"

I answered her question with a question. "Why do you ask?"

"Well," she replied, "a boy in my class is telling everybody that Santa Claus is pretend."

I asked another question. "What do you think?"

"Well, Santa is awful fat. How can somebody that fat fit down a chimbley?"

I was undaunted. "Morgan, remember when we found that mouse in my house, and you asked me how it got in? Remember I told you that mice could collapse their bodies to a quarter of an inch and slip in through a heating grate?"

She nodded.

I continued. "Well, Santa is magic! Just like a mouse, he can collapse his body so that it's small enough to slide down any chimney."

"But, Mawmaw, sometimes I'm at my house on Christmas, and sometimes I'm at your house, and sometimes I'm at Granny Annie's. How does Santa always know where to bring my toys?"

"I write him a letter every November to let him know where you will be."

"How does Santa get into houses that don't have chimbleys?

"For those houses, Santa has a magic key that opens any door."

Now she really looked confused. "If Santa has a key that opens any door, why does he bother with chimbleys at all?"

I was running out of answers. "Have you asked your mom about this?"

She looked up at me with trusting blue eyes and said, "Yes, I did ask Mommy, but I know that *you* will tell me the truth."

I was in a quandary. I did not want to be the one to tell her that Santa Claus was not real; yet, if I withheld the truth now, she might never trust me again

Suddenly, out of nowhere, an image of an 8 x 10 black and white photo, lying underneath a row of hanging file folders in my office cabinet, filled my head.

"Just a minute, honey," I told her, and I ran from the room. "I'll be right back!"

I hurried to the filing cabinet in my office and searched as fast as my fingers would sift. In the third drawer down, I found what I wanted and ran back to Morgan. "Here!" I gushed. "This is a photo signed by the man himself!"

She stared at the black and white photo. "What did he sign his name Sergeant Santa?"

"Uhm.... that's what the elves call him," I improvised. "It's like a boot camp in the North Pole around Christmas time!"

She traced his beard with her tiny index finger. "I knew he was real," she whispered.

I never doubted Santa again.

Flying Blind

I'm sure you've heard the term "flying straight and level," and how about, "flying by the seat of your pants?" It's one thing to fly when you can look out the window and make sure the wings and nose are level with the horizon, and can see at least three miles ahead of your flight path, but it's something else when all the visual markers are gone and you are "flying blind."

I remember a story my instructor told me when I was learning instrument flying. The flight school I had chosen for all of my training was owned by two old men that had been flying since back in the 20's. One of them had built his own plane back then and learned to fly in it. Needless to say, they were a wealth of experience, and I'm sure the Lord had His hand in my going there. Anyway, back to the story. Ned, that was his name, told me about an experience he had flying from Indiana to Birmingham, Alabama. This was back in the days of the wood and fabric biplanes of the early 1930's. They had no navigational instrumentation in those days, it was strictly "by the seat of your pants." He made it there alright, but when it was time to head back home the clouds /ceiling was very low, in fact the tops of the hills were in the clouds. He decided to take off and fly low through the valleys until he found a hole in the clouds where he could get up on top of the clouds. This he was able to do thinking he would find another hole in which he could get down through to land later. The problem was the hole didn't materialize. He was stuck "on top." Finally, he was about to run out of gas, it was nail biting time. Ned told me how in those days they would trim the airplane to fly "straight and level" with the power off, and let the plane take them down through the clouds, with their hands off the controls. Crazy, yes? Well, there was nothing else to do, so he tried it. He kept going down, thinking he would see the ground and be able to take over control and land in a field, but it didn't happen that way. Ned said the first thing he saw was a tree go whizzing past his wing and he ended up in a pasture. Now that is flying blind.

What can we take from Ned's experience for our spiritual life? Certainly, we don't want to fly blind! And yet, how many people spiritually, thinking everything will work out when the time comes to face eternity. Well, for one thing, how many times have we gone off on our own and gotten ourselves between the proverbial rock and a hard place, with nowhere to go? We can feel the fear start to come up in our being, taking over all our thinking. Finally, we come to the realization there's only One that can help us make it through to a safe landing, praying something like Psm.102:2..." In the day I'm in trouble, in the day when I call answer me speedily!" And what does God say? "I will instruct thee and teach thee in the way which thou shalt go: I will guide thee with mine eye." Psalm 32:8, also, "Be still and know that I am God," Psalm. 46:10.

The truth of the matter is, **if** God is our PILOT and not our CO-PILOT, He has promised to take us through all the way to a safe landing on the other side. After naming off many who have gone on before us in Hebrews 11, God tells us in Heb. 13:5, "I will never leave **thee**, nor forsake **thee**. In my old King James Bible, the first 9 verses of Psalm. 37 says time after time, **trust**, **fret not**, **commit**, **rest**, **wait**, **delight**, and **cease**. Read these verses, they will bless you

The rest of Ned's story did not end well. Ned was without God. I got to talk to him twice about his need of Christ in his life. Some of his last words to me before he died was, "Layne, I've done it my way for so long, it's hard to change." It makes me sad now just to put it on paper. This is one of the reasons I **HATE** the song, "I did it my way." What a lie of the enemy. To be continued...
