A Note from the Pastor...

In September and October (except for Homecoming Sunday) the sermons will focus on the seven cities that received the messages found in Revelation 2-3. These cities are on the far western edge of present-day Turkey, along the Mediterranean Sea. In today's modern Turkey these cities either no longer exist or have been renamed. It would seem as though they didn't heed the warnings found in their respective messages. As we look at these churches, inevitably we will find both truth and warnings that also apply to us...here...today.

On a somewhat related topic, not far from where these cities were, and a couple of countries to the east, is another place that the entire world has been very aware of. Afghanistan. The people of this country are living in fear for their future. Anyone 25 years old or younger probably doesn't remember living under the Taliban rule of the 1990's. There are Christians in that country who have a complete uncertainty about their future, perhaps not very different from the churches mentioned in Revelation.

In the comfort and relative safety, we enjoy in this country, the most powerful action we can take on their behalf is to pray for them. So...how "big" do you pray? Remember that we pray to a God for whom nothing is impossible. We will never out-pray God's capabilities, so I encourage you to pray *big*, but only praying as Christ and the words of Christ dwell in us.

How have I begun to pray for Afghanistan? I pray for peace, safety, and security. I pray for calm in the middle of chaos. I pray that in the midst of fear Christians in Afghanistan will be filled with the peace of Christ. I pray that they would have a new opportunity to make an impact on their neighbors for the Kingdom of the living and true God. But what's my *big* prayer? That the Holy Spirit would stir in the hearts of the new Taliban leaders, finding a love, peace, and joy in Christ that leads to an assurance of eternal life. It is easy to view these leaders in a variety of ways, most of them negatively. Many would say that that prayer is unrealistically ridiculous. But if God chooses to work in the hearts of these leaders, can you imagine the miracle we would be witnessing? I think that's praying *really* big! But our God is that big. So, return to the question: How big do you pray?

"If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples." (John 15:7-8)

"...Very truly, I tell you, if you ask anything of the Father in my name, he will give it to you. Until now you have not asked for anything in my name. Ask and you will receive, so that your joy may be complete." (John 16:23-24)

Are not you glad your mother did not choose Abortion for YOU?? I surely am!

One of the things that has always bothered me greatly in talking to Christians about the nearness of the Rapture, when Jesus will call His followers home, is that so many say or imply that it could be years away yet. Would you fall into this group? Do you think in terms of what will the world be like for your grandchildren? Well, I shall try to show you that the question should be, will we celebrate the next communion service here, or in Heaven? Will the pastor officiate, or will Jesus break the bread?

As we look at the prophecies of God about the end times, we see things that give clues to the timing of the fulfillment of said prophecy. For example, God told Daniel in 12:4 to close up the book until the time of the end. Then God was good enough to give us clues to when that will be, "many shall go to and fro, and knowledge shall be increased." Today answers both of these statements. Everyone is on the go. We complain about it, but buy a new car anyway. Airline aircraft going everywhere in the world are full. Go and come, to and fro. The last statement? The last thing I've read about knowledge increase, data which was several years old, was that man's knowledge is doubled EVERY TWELVE MONTHS! (However, in about 5 years it will be every 12 HOURS!) Young people go into debt for a college education and by the time they graduate what they learned is obsolete. Sooo, God gave us two good clues to now being time of the Rapture! Are there more clues? Oh, yes! For you old folks, like me, does this remind you of that board game years back, Clue? It was Miss Scarlet, with the knife, in the observatory!

Have you ever known a time when the whole world was in lockstep together concerning a global "crisis" like today? I believe you would agree with me, the answer is never. Could it happen again in the

future? Mmm, maybe. The fact is, if there is a next time it would probably be easier, we've been primed already. Whether this "crisis" or another will lead us into the New World Order doesn't matter, what matters is we see how easy it will be. Now for another thought.

The book of Revelation is a book of time sensitive prophecy. There are any number of things mentioned in the book that points to a specific time just as Daniel does, and that time is now, today. Rev 11 talks about two witnesses that are seen by the whole world. This is pointing to the technology of today, where we watch news around the world in real time. (I remember as a kid in grade school having 16 mm movie films about every month, put out by the two largest newspapers in the state showing the world news to the kids in school, of course what we saw was weeks old.) If today were the day for the two witnesses of Rev.11, to make themselves known, everyone in the world would see them on their cellphones immediately!

In Rev 13:15 it says the false prophet gives life to a statue of the anti-Christ. It talks and thinks for itself, commanding those that won't worship the image to be killed! That is a time stamp for TODAY! It's called singularity. Chapter 13 goes on to talk about a one world government, one world religion, and one world financial system, all of which is being formed right now. The global elitists of the world, the World Economic Forum, the UN, etc., are taking us to a one world government with a date of completion NO LATER THAN 2030. One world religion is being spearheaded by the Pope. Have you been following his actions and goings? One world financial system has been in the works for some time, of course. It is headed toward a digital currency as fast as it can go, when those in power can touch a button and you can't get to your bank account. For sure the technology will be way past what Revelation talks about.

So, what can we take from all if this?

1. There is a set time for future events on God's calendar.
2. God in His prophecies of the last days has given us keys to understand the time.
3. That time could not have been before now, if it had, we would already be in Heaven.
4. That time cannot be 10-15 years, or later, in the future, technology would be way beyond what we see in prophecy.
5. That leaves only one other possibility, MARANATHA!!!

PS- Am I setting the date of the rapture? No, what I'm saying is that it can't be years in the future, and there is every reason to believe it could be today! Look up, our redemption draws nigh!

The Cat's Meow

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I cannot remember a time that I did not love cats. When I was little, any kitty would do. I loved having a little ball of fur curled up on my lap while I scratched behind its ears and listened to the little motor inside it, the one that purred until my fingertips tingled.

In 1970 I was given a seal point Siamese cat as an engagement present. I named him Beau Garcon, and I did not expect to like him. I had seen *Lady and the Tramp*, and the Siamese cats in that movie were EVIL!!! Beau, however, turned out to be my dream cat. He followed me from room to room, and whenever I sat down, he jumped onto my lap immediately and stared up at me with his sky-blue eyes. He loved to have his ears scratched and his purr was a lullaby. Beau was also vocal. His *meows* and his *whyyys* filled our little apartment, especially when he was annoyed or excited.

After Beau passed on, I had three other Siamese cats, and they all possessed that same sweet temperament, that same degree of affection, and that same vocal hardness. It would have been impossible for me to not love them. In fact, I spoiled them rotten.

When my daughter was born, however, my cats had to play second fiddle. I could hardly believe that this delightful little red-headed infant who never stopped smiling was my child. I was so fascinated with her capacity for joy (an enigma to me) that nothing else seemed to matter. Every free minute I had was hers.

Years later, though, my daughter went to bed one evening a normal kid and woke up the next morning a teenager. Being seen in the presence of her parents was a rare form of torture to her. Trying too hard to win back her affection just made things worse.

Instead of mourning the time I had once spent with my daughter, I adopted a petite seal point Siamese cat that I named Marisa. She was the runt of her litter and had been neglected by her mother. Every other cat I ever had knew instinctively how to use the litter box. Marisa was the first cat that I had ever actually had to potty train. She was quite pitiful. "Marisa has been with me for years and has never clawed any of my furniture," I assured her.

When we finally arrived at my house, I helped my mother to the kitchen door. Marisa was waiting for us. She and Mama glared at one another for a minute or two before Marisa retreated to the far side of the room.

The next day, while I was making dinner, Marisa rubbed her lean body against my leg, as Mama watched us with extreme distaste plastered all over her face. "I don't see how you can stand a cat in the kitchen!" she snapped.

"Mama," I said sweetly, an idea forming itself in my head, "what you don't understand is that Marisa is special."

"I don't see anything special about that cat," she retorted.

"Mama, that's because you don't know that Marisa can talk," I informed her.

"Huh!" she barked in disbelief. "Cats can't talk!"

As if on cue, Marisa walked slowly and elegantly to the kitchen door and cried "Meow!"

"See," I told Mama, "She said 'me out'."

Mama, her face as pale as a ghost, gasped! "Why, it did sound like she said "me out!"

I looked at Marisa and said, "No, Marisa, you can't go out."

"Whyyyy?" was her plaintive response.

I looked at Mama and said, "See, she wants to know why she can't go out."

"Why....it did sound like she asked you 'why!'" Mama was beside herself. "What else can she say?"

"Marisa is a cat of few words, Mama," I confided. "She mostly likes to listen. And she is really good at keeping secrets."

After I finished the dishes that evening, I went downstairs to the family room. As I approached the doorway, I could see Mama sitting on the sofa with Marisa curled up beside her.
